



Pet Recovery Tips

HSSV will hold onto stray felines without identification for a minimum of 3 days and stray canines without identification for a minimum of 5 days. This hold period is extended if the animal has a microchip or if the animal is wearing a license tag and/or a personalized name tag. Please be advised that hold periods may vary among shelters.

Use these tips to increase the likelihood of bringing your pet back home.

- **ARM YOURSELF WITH KNOWLEDGE**

Check out <https://missionreunite.org> for tips and tricks to aid in reuniting with your pet as well as for information on lost pet behavior.

- **PUT UP POSTERS & HAND OUT FLYERS**

Post in areas with high foot traffic rather than in busy intersections - people are more likely to read signs while walking than when driving. Use neon colored poster paper and write important information, such as your contact details and animal's description in large print. If possible, include a picture of your pet. Hand out flyers to neighbors and post in local hang-outs (Starbucks, grocery stores, restaurants, etc.). You can utilize <http://www.petbond.com/flyerentry.php> to create a flyer.

- **VISIT LOCAL SHELTERS**

Take a lost tour every day at your local animal shelters. While most shelters post information online, animals often look different when they are scared and you may not recognize your pet's photo. While at the shelters you can request to file a lost report.

- **REGISTER OR UPDATE YOUR PET'S MICROCHIP**

If your animal has a microchip, call the microchip company to report your pet missing. Also, confirm that your contact information is current and that your phone can receive voicemails. If you don't know which company your pet's microchip is registered to you can look it up at <http://www.petmicrochiplookup.org/>.

- **RENT A HUMANE TRAP**

If your pet is frightened and you are unable to catch them, setting a humane trap with yummy bait may help you recover him or her.

- **POST A LOST PET AD**

Check www.findingrover.org and Craigslist for found ads and post a lost pet ad. Use social media and post to Facebook, Twitter, and Next Door (a mobile app that allows you to directly reach out to your neighbors) to get the word out.

Most importantly, don't give up! Keep looking and actively searching for your pet!
