

The first time our team met Aria, she was terrified. The young border collie mix had her tail between her legs and made it clear she was not comfortable being handled. She was brought to us as a stray and had very little experience meeting new people.

Aria came to us at the perfect time. Our Animal Care team was expanding their work, and they were now responsible for providing enrichment to shelter animals. This included working with our Behavior team to increase their ability to help our shy and fearful dogs build confidence. Practicing

their new skills by working with Aria, they were overjoyed with the results.

came to visit, and with a trusted friend by her side, she was open to meeting even more people. Aria was blossoming.



# From Tragedy to New Beginnings



Seeing Bam Bam's sweet, happy personality now, you would hardly know that a few months before, the Pomeranian had been through something horrific. He had been traveling in a car with his loving family, which included humans and two other dogs, when the car was in a severe accident. Bam Bam was the sole survivor of the crash. He had a traumatic partial amputation of

his leg and other painful wounds. But thanks to your generosity, Bam Bam was about to get a second chance.

He was taken to a shelter in the Central Valley, where the staff notified our Rescue team about Bam Bam and his injuries right away. Our team made a special trip the next day just to pick him up.

# Your generosity is life-changing for animals like Bam Bam—thank you!

When Bam Bam arrived in our Medical center, we were shocked at the state of his injuries. He was becoming septic, meaning his body was responding to an infection by damaging its own tissues—a life-threatening condition. His fever was high, and the partially amputated tissues in his leg had started to die. He was rushed into surgery, where his leg was amputated skillfully by Dr. Moore, one of our veterinarians with a specialty in orthopedics.




The surgery was a success, and our team breathed easier knowing that the sweet dog would make it. He was started on medications to help with the pain and prevent infection. We sent him to stay with an experienced foster who would help him through recovery and learn to adjust to life on three legs. Over the next few weeks, Bam Bam made an incredible recovery. He was a different dog from the one we had met just weeks earlier, barely clinging to life. He was doing well living life on three legs, and showed off his friendly, outgoing, joyful personality wherever he went.

Exactly a month after Bam Bam had gone through the worst possible thing, his life took another turn—this time, for the better. He found a home. His new family fell in love immediately when meeting him. They waited weeks for



Bam Bam to be healthy enough to come home, and when he was finally ready, they were overjoyed.

# **Breaking Ground on Our New Cat Garden!**



At HSSV, we are always asking ourselves two questions: how can we help more animals in need? And, how can we better serve the animals in our care? Thanks to your generosity, we could answer both questions at once with the development of our second cat garden.

Years ago, our garden cat adoption program was created to give a pathway to adoption for cats that are not social with people and not suitable for a traditional adoption as indoor pets. The Marilyn and Fred Anderson Community Cat Garden was built to give these cats an outdoor space appropriate for their needs while they waited to find "homes" in barns, wineries, and businesses. The program was a success, and hundreds of garden cats have been adopted since its inception.

Two years ago, we made the decision to expand the program by creating a second garden. The new garden would increase our capacity to help more garden cats and improve some of the features in the first garden. It would give cats in our care enhanced space, providing even more enrichment opportunities to meet their needs.



This garden would be visible to the public and would house our more social garden cats that have some affinity for humans or a history of indoor/outdoor living before they came to us. The Marilyn and Fred Anderson Community Cat Garden would be upgraded to better fit the needs of our cats and used primarily for the less social cats due to its more private and secluded location.

Suzanne Maas, a dedicated and longtime donor with a passion for cats, generously funded the new garden, named Kona's Spot in the Sun. The garden will be located in front of our building to bring visibility to the garden cat program, as well as educational opportunities through plaques and signage for visitors wanting to learn more about garden cats.

Other features include: an escape-proof enclosure, protection from the elements, access to both sun and shade, plenty of hiding places, cat-friendly vegetation, and easy solutions for our team to safely catch cats when they have been adopted. We broke ground on the new garden in September 2021 and will be celebrating its completion in the winter.

Thanks to the generous donation from Suzanne and the support from our extraordinary community, Kona's Spot in the Sun will help us care for more cats with unique needs, as well as provide the right kind of environment to help them succeed. We're so grateful for the opportunity your support gives us to save and care for so many deserving animals. Come visit us to see our new garden in action!

# A Journey Filled with Love

The skinny kitten had just made the long trek from the Central Valley in our rescue vehicle when one of our veterinarians first met her. Her appearance was startling—both eyes were enlarged and appeared to have ruptured. Our Medical team didn't want the kitten to spend any more time in pain. We could provide the urgent care she needed because of donors like you.

The kitten was rushed into surgery right away. Once under anesthesia, her eyes were examined in greater detail and we determined she had an ocular condition that was too severe for treatment. Dr. Campbell, one of our incredible veterinarians, removed both of the kitten's eyes. She also placed the kitten on antibiotics to prevent

a postoperative infection and pain reliever to help her through recovery. Medical staff and volunteers stayed with her through the next few hours as she slowly woke up to ensure everything had gone well. The surgery was successful, and she was already showing some of her loving personality.

By the next day, Love, as she was named, was doing so much better. She was eating well, starting to play, and her surgery sites were looking good. A couple days later, our Medical team was confident enough in the way she was healing that she was sent to a foster home with one of our veterinary technicians, Naadia, to finish recovering.


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Love, or Zelda as she is now known, had to have both eyes removed. Thanks to your support, she received the care she needed and is thriving.
